DEVOLUTION AND WHAT IT MEANS FOR BROUGHTON AND LANCASHIRE

Devolution

In recent years, the process of devolution has been an ongoing topic of discussion across the UK, and for Lancashire, this shift in governance could signal significant changes. But what exactly does devolution mean for Broughton, and how will the upcoming decisions impact residents, businesses, and local services?

The Current Devolution Landscape

At present, Broughton is part of the Lancashire Combined Authority (LCA), which is made up of Lancashire County Council (LCC), Blackburn with Darwen, Blackpool, and the 12 districts, towns, and cities that make up the rest of the county. Each of these areas has two advisory representatives in the LCA, ensuring that local voices are heard in regional decision-making. However, as it stands, Lancashire is a 'level two' combined authority, which means it does not have a directly elected mayor, and as a result, the region is missing out on substantial government funding that could help address local issues and improve services.

The Path to Devolution

In November 2025, Lancashire's 15 local authorities will submit devolution plans to the government, which could result in one or more Unitary Authorities. These authorities would combine local and district council services into one body, potentially streamlining services but also changing how they are delivered. If approved, this could unlock more funding and powers, giving the region greater control over local development.

What Does This Mean for Broughton?

The Lancashire Combined Authority brings together Lancashire County Council (LCC),

Blackburn with Darwen, Blackpool. The 12 District, Town, and City Councils (including Preston), having two advisory representatives on the Combined Authority.

A Combined Authorities key function is to provide the strategic direction of a geographical area, in our case Lancashire. The LCA was established in 2024. At present, this is a Level 2 Combined Authority, meaning there is no elected mayor, which limits access to some of the larger funding opportunities available to mayor-led regions. A recent proposal by LCC for a public referendum on introducing a mayor was rejected by central government.

The English Devolution and Community Engagement Bill published on the 14th of July, sets out a timeline for change:

Important dates:

• November 2025: Local authorities submit devolution proposals.

This could lead to 2–3 or more Unitary Authorities in Lancashire. The Unitary Authorities will combine the Lancashire County and Preston City Council functions. As yet there has been no information publicised on which other districts Preston City will be unitised with.

- May 2026: Government confirms unitary authority boundaries.
- May 2026 or 2027: Mayoral elections but will only affect Lancashire if Tier 1 status is granted.
- May 2027: Elections for new unitary councils (reducing over 800 councillors to around 200) who will serve in shadow form until> May 2028, "Vesting Day" when the new authorities officially take over.

There is no change in the status of Parishes, Neighbourhood Councils and Towns, but it may mean being asked to take on other services and "assets" such as parks based on experience in other areas.

As the devolution process unfolds, we will continue to keep you informed on how these changes may impact Broughton and the wider area.
